Task: Tiber Island

Tiber Island is a unique urban island in the Tiber that is located in the center of Rome. About 400 meters long and 90 meters wide, it is connected to the river banks by two bridges.

In summer, Tiber Island is at the center of the events of the so-called Roman Summer (Estate Romana) that take place along the west bank of the river; overall, it is a path at the water level equipped with stands that host bars, food areas. discos, recreational, exhibition and commercial spaces and more for a total distance of approximately 1.400 meters.

During the summer, the Tiber Island hosts a film festival of about 90 days during which film premieres, film awards and competitions, thematic reviews, debates, exhibitions, screenings in parallel with numerous other events and entertainment spaces follow one another.

However, the entire event is organized with a general framework that can be improved and with low quality architectural elements. The entire space can be improved by trying to creatively intervene on: Inclusiveness/Planimetric organization/Temporary urban quality.



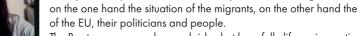
There are additional pavilions on the modular platforms that lead across the river. Here people can relax, **Eat Together** comfortably and meet friends.

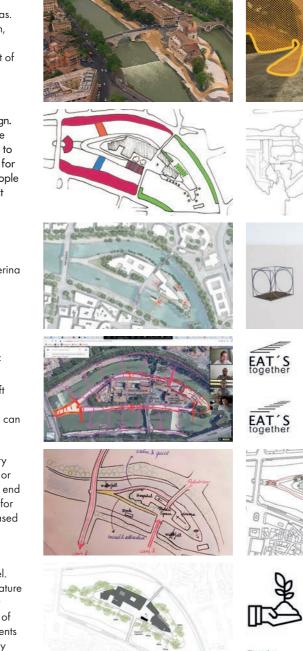
